Mozambique – Gaza Inhambe Global Youth Tobacco Survey (GYTS)



The Mozambique – Gaza Inhambe GYTS includes data on prevalence of cigarette and other tobacco use as well as information on five determinants of tobacco use: access/availability and price, environmental tobacco smoke exposure (ETS), cessation, media and advertising, and school curriculum. These determinants are components Mozambique could include in a comprehensive tobacco control program. The Mozambique – Gaza Inhambe GYTS was a school-based survey of students in grades 7-9, conducted in 2002. A

two-stage cluster sample design was used to produce representative data for all of Gaza Inhambe. At the first stage, schools were selected with probability proportional to enrollment size. At the second stage, classes were randomly selected and all students in selected classes were eligible to participate. The school response rate was 100%, the student response rate was 87.9%, and the overall response rate was 87.9%. A total of 1872 students participated in the Mozambique – Gaza Inhambe GYTS.

Prevalence

10.0% of students had ever smoked cigarettes (Boys = 12.7%, Girls = 7.2%)

10.1% currently use any tobacco product (Boys = 10.0%, Girls = 10.5%)

3.7% currently smoke cigarettes (Boys = 4.3%, Girls = 3.3%)

7.5% currently use other tobacco products (Boys = 6.9%, Girls = 8.3%)

28.6% of never smokers are likely to initiate smoking next year

Knowledge and Attitudes

36.3% think boys and 26.5% think girls who smoke have more friends 36.2% think boys and 33.3% think girls who smoke look more attractive

Access and Availability - Current Smokers

45.1% usually smoke at home

16.2% buy cigarettes in a store

* who bought cigarettes in a store were NOT refused purchase because of their age

Environmental Tobacco Smoke

26.0% live in homes where others smoke in their presence

36.3% are around others who smoke in places outside their home

73.9% think smoking should be banned from public places

40.9% think smoke from others is harmful to them

19.9% have one or more parents who smoke

1.3% have most or all friends who smoke

Cessation - Current Smokers

* want to stop smoking

* tried to stop smoking during the past year 75.4% have ever received help to stop smoking

Media and Advertising

74.5% saw anti-smoking media messages, in the past 30 days

69.1% saw pro-cigarette ads on billboards, in the past 30 days

60.0% saw pro-cigarette ads in newspapers or magazines, in the past 30 days

17.2% have an object with a cigarette brand logo

9.6% were offered free cigarettes by a tobacco company representative

School

52.9% had been taught in class, during the past year, about the dangers of smoking

29.3% had discussed in class, during the past year, reasons why people their age smoke

48.4% had been taught in class, during the past year, the effects of tobacco use

Highlights

- 10% of students currently use any form of tobacco; nearly 4% currently smoke cigarettes; over 7% currently use some other form of tobacco.
- ETS indicates almost 3 in 10 students live in homes where others smoke in their presence; almost 4 in 10 are exposed to smoke in public places; almost 2 in 10 have parents who smoke.
- 4 in 10 students think smoke from others is harmful to them.
- Over 7 in 10 students think smoking in public places should be banned.
- Over 7 in 10 students saw antismoking media messages in the past 30 days; almost 7 in 10 students saw pro-cigarette ads in the past 30 days.
